

SYNOPSIS

Hair is sung from the voice of the "Tribe," a group of politically active, long-haired hippies who welcome the Age of Aquarius against a backdrop of bohemian New York City: exploring the questions at the heart of our lives, the weight of the decisions we make, and the ongoing paradox of fighting and freedom. Told from the perspectives of Claude, the "Aquarius" destined for "greatness or madness," his good friend Berger, their roommate Sheila, and their friends, the Tribe struggle to balance their young lives, loves, and the sexual revolution with their rebellion against conscription into the Vietnam War and their conservative parents and society. Ultimately, Claude must decide whether to resist the draft along with his friends, or to succumb to the pressures of his parents (and conservative America) to serve in Vietnam; compromising his pacifistic principles and risking his life, and ultimately leaving us with the unanswerable question: To whom do we owe the greater loyalty—to ourselves, or the voices around us?

Nick is also a veteran SBHS Music Theatre performer, having performed in most of the above mentioned productions as well as last years DP High production of Legally Blonde, music directed by John Douglas.



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
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


WHO'S WHO?

Jenna Tico (Choreographer) is a 4th generation Santa Barbara High School graduate, and elated to be back "home" in the theatre. After making her performance debut on the Courthouse stage in 1993, Jenna went on to collaborate with Summer Solstice for more than 20 years, authoring Santa Barbara Summer Solstice in 2014 with photographer Arthur Fisher and performing with Hip Brazil, Panzumo, La Boheme Dance Company, and many others. She also teaches/performs with Lucidity Festival, Fishbon Arts Collaborative, the Burleskimos, and Proximity Theatre Company, and is a founding member of World Dance for Humanity. While earning her B.A. at Scripps College, Jenna was introduced to Contact Improvisation under the watchful eye of Jessica Harris, and went on to study with AXIS Dance Company in Oakland, CA; and since then, has danced her way from Bali to Rwanda. When she's not teaching improv or performing in strange public spaces, Jenna can be found writing grants or training at Interchange Counseling Institute in San Francisco, CA, where she is currently pursuing certification. 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WHO'S WHO?

Jon Nathan (Musical Director), has been a figure in the Santa Barbara musical scene since his arrival in the area in 1992. He holds a Bachelor of Music in lazz Studies from the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, and a Master of Music in Percussion Performance from California State University at Northridge. During his time there, he was introduced to William Kraft, and was asked to continue studies with Professor Kraft at UCSB, where he completed his Doctor of Musical Arts degree. Currently, Dr. Nathan is principal timpanist with Opera Santa Barbara as well as Director of lazz Ensembles and Lecturer in Percussion and Percussion Ensemble at UCSB. He has served as lazz Ensemble Director and Percussion Instructor at Moorpark College, has taught Techniques of Percussion at and private percussion lessons at Westmont College, and was the Applied Music Percussion Instructor at Santa Barbara City College. Dr. Nathan is also an endurance athlete having completed three Ironman triathlons (most recently in Boulder, Colorado, in August of 2015and in November of 2012 competed in the Santa Barbara Red Rock 50 Mile Trail Race, and is very interested in the physical and mental connection between endurance training and racing and music performance preparation and performance. Hair is Dr. Nathan's sixth collaboration with SBHS Music Theatre, having served as Music Director for Pippin (Fall, 2015), How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying (Spring, 2014) and Big Fish (Fall, 2014), Music of the Night (Winter 2016), and as Instrumental Music Director for SPAMALOT (Spring, 2013).

Sio Tepper (Vocal Director) grew up in the local music scene as a native to Santa Barbara. Upon graduating SBHS in 2010, she entered UCSB with a music scholarship for a B.M. in piano performance. During her time at UCSB, she explored many musical styles such as American folk music, North Indian classical music, and jazz. She graduated in 2014 with a B.A. in Ethnomusicology.

Currently, she teaches piano privately to students of various ages. She also performs locally on piano and guitar, continuing to explore her passion of composition and songwriting. Sio strives to give back to the community that helped her grow as an artist through her continued involvement in youth music education. This is her sixth collaboration with the SBHS Theater Department and her first time being Vocal Director. She is greatly honored to come back to her alma mater and have the



A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR



Doing this musical reminds me that HAIR, though now nearly fifty years old(!), is a fiercely young play; when we began working on Claude's cri de couer Where Do I Go?, it was in the midst of anxious young adults waiting to hear from schools they had applied to, waiting for the next step in their lives. HAIR is a play about identity, and who gets to decide who you are. What better place than a high school to do this play—high school is a joyful riot of self-discovery, sometimes angry, many times tearful; it always alive with creation and the

editing and re-editing of our selves. Creativity is messy and loud, full of halting steps and throw-away ideas, back and forths, tears, laughter, and the accessing and artistic transformation of deep, intense emotions.

The audience sees only the end result—which I think is why, as much as people say they want creativity at the forefront of education, it can be frightening to the lay public. Try walking into the middle of a theatre class and getting your bearings! Theatre is organized chaos, with the process of editing and shaping built in to it—and it is never static. Theatre is a living organism, and no two performances are ever alike. It is dangerous and exhilarating, a high-wire act done with a few brave companions in front of an audience with high expectations. It is unlike any other academic discipline. Theatre students demonstrate their mastery in real time, and receive feedback in real time.

This musical is often done, I think, with actors who are too old for the roles—the characters in HAIR are high school dropouts, runaways, college protestors, and those of draft age in 1968—in other words, 16 to 19 year olds. High school students are in the midst of the same questions of identity and authority and authenticity as the characters in HAIR. In a contemporary world where presidential candidates talk about carpet bombing ISIS into the stone age (think Barry Goldwater and General Curtis LeMay, ca. 1964), HAIR is eerily prescient. It is a curious play, truly contemporary when it exploded onto the scene in April of 1968, a Broadway musical whose relationship to the present day was measured in moments. 48 years later, it is neither a period piece, nor nostalgia—it is still hard-edged and demanding of us. The people of my generation, who vowed never to trust anyone over 30, are now 60, and we are now the object of raised fists and protests and howls of disbelief and mistrust.

A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

While we would like to think that things have changed for the better since the riotous tumult of 1968, where the widening generation gap played out on a national, even global stage, and the young said (we are not like you); where old men in suits said (with a straight face), we should bomb them back into the stone age, and carpet bombing first made its way into the national vernacular; where personal freedom and public responsibility clashed openly—while we would like to think things have changed, they have not. We still call for young men (and now women) to go to far-off locales, to win hearts and minds with lethal firepower and sometimes indiscriminate death rained from the sky; we still fear our youth and their clothes and music and ideas; we have presidential candidates who demonize the other and call for ludicrous great walls and prying eyes, soft walks and big sticks.

Here is what else we have: we still have the young who are better than us—who are more tolerant, who embrace difference with much more grace, who love the exotic and fear the mundane, who say torture is not patriotic, peace is not treason, life matters and the planet matters. It is why I am still here, still thankful for the exuberance and courage and outrageous joy of high school artists, at a school where bold is the bar we set for ourselves. Look around you; this is demonstrably a place owned by student actors and artists. It is a theatre with an identity—you know that when you walk in the doors the entire theatre, from house to stage, from wing to wing, is dedicated to the fierce, bright spirit of creativity.

I cannot tell you how fortunate I am to even be here; I tell my students to open themselves to the great possibilities of the world, to experience and learn and seek as much as possible, and cultivate the ability to recognize a crossroad: and then to choose boldly. At my particular crossroads, my not-yet wife said matter-of-factly, "You should teach." I went back to school at 38. At 39, while I was finishing my credential work, the teacher who was here before me left abruptly, and I met J.R. Richards, the principal then at SBHS, and the man who believed in a loud, long-haired, multi-earring me —and my life was changed forever. At 39 I married the love of my life and inherited four energetic and passionate children, at 40 became a father (and that most wonderful child graduates this year), and my wife and I have spent the past twenty years in the company of incredible students, and designers, and musicians. We have made beautiful, ephemeral things, and I have had the privilege of learning from amazing collaborators who believed that great art could be made at a high school.

Thank you, my love, for this adventurous and passionate life. Thank you for pointing me to this door, at that time, and telling me to **just open it.**

And thank you, SBHS, for twenty amazing years. I feel like we are just beginning.
