### **SYNOPSIS**

The Leading Player and Players set the stage for a unique dramatic event, introducing Pippin to the audience. Pippin has just returned home from University, and wants to find meaning in his life. Guided by the Leading Player, Pippin tries war, fighting alongside Charles and Lewis. Pippin then asks Berthe, his grandmother, for advice, and she suggests sexual experimentation. Meanwhile, Fastrada, Pippin's conniving stepmother, concocts a plan to get her son Lewis closer to the throne than Pippin. Pippin falls into her trap, killing Charles and attempting to rule the empire. The Leading Player resuscitates Charles when Pippin asks, and Pippin continues searching. Finally, he meets a woman named Catherine who has a young son, Theo. Pippin uneasily settles into family life with Catherine, although he is in love with her. Pippin eventually leaves Catherine and returns to the Leading Player. Finally, the Leading Player and the Players attempt to convince Pippin to go up in flame as a final statement about his life.


4. Fight a grizzly bear

Christina McCarthy (Choreographer) is Acting Vice Chair of Theater and Dance and Director of Dance at UC Santa Barbara. She teaches all levels of modern technique, choreographs for both Dance Program Productions and Theater Productions within the department. She has choreographed for local high school and professional theater companies over the last fifteen years. She preformed with Nina Wiener Dance Company in New York and was both a dancer and Assistant Artistic Director of Santa Barbara Dance Theater. Last spring three productions she collaborated on earned Independent Theater Awards: Naked Shakes "A Midsummer Nights Dream". UCSB Theater's production of "In the Red and Brown Water" and "La La Strada" presented by Proboscis Theater Company. "La La Strada" also earned the 2015 Bitter Lemons Outrageous Award for Theater at the Hollywood Fringe Festival. Her latest projects include a site-specific dance and music installation in collaboration with the UCSB Music Department for the Library Grand Opening Ceremony in January 2016, choreographing the musical "Pippin" for Santa Barbara High School, and in the spring she will choreograph and movement advise two new productions, "We Want the Funk" and "The Death of Kings".

Jon Nathan (Musical Director), has been a figure in the Santa Barbara musical scene since his arrival in 1992. He holds a Bachelor of Music in Jazz Studies from the University of Massachusetts. Amherst, and a Master of Music in Percussion Performance from California State University at Northridge, During his time there, he was introduced to William Kraft, and was asked to continue studies with Professor Kraft at UCSB, where he completed his Doctor of Musical Arts degree. Currently, Dr. Nathan is principal timpanist with Opera Santa Barbara as well as Director of Jazz Ensembles and Lecturer in Percussion and Percussion Ensemble at IICSR. He has served as Jazz Ensemble Director and Percussion Instructor at Moorpark College, has taught Techniques of Percussion at and private percussion lessons at Westmont College, and was the Applied Music Percussion Instructor at Santa Barbara City College. Dr. Nathan is also an endurance athlete having completed three Ironman triathlons (most recently in Boulder, Colorado, in August of 2015 and in November of 2012 competed in the Santa Barbara Red Rock 50 Mile Trail Race, and is very interested in the physical and mental connection between endurance training and racing and music performance preparation and performance. Pippin is Dr. Nathan's fourth collaboration with SBHS Music Theatre, having served as Music Director for How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying (Spring, 2014) and Big Fish (Fall, 2014), and as Instrumental Music Director for SPAMALOT (Spring, 2013).

Rachel Short (Vocal Director) is excited to be joining SBHS again as Vocal Director for a show with such vibrant music. She is a Ph.D candidate in Music Theory at University of California, Santa Barbara, where she currently teaches Fundamentals of Music. Her M.A. is from Queens College, City University of New York, in Music Theory. She has enjoyed various teaching, music arranging, and choral directing posts in music, theatre, voice, dance, and acting in Santa Barbara, New York City, New Jersey and San Diego. She composed music for the original musical "Gretel & Hansel," which she also choreographed. She also leads worship at Santa Barbara Community Church.

As a performer, Rachel recently made her Santa Barbara debut as Queenie in The Wild Party (Out Of the Box Theatre Co.). Other favorite productions include The Music Man (North Carolina Theatre, The Welk Resort Theatre, San Diego Civic Light Opera), Camelot (national tour with Robert Goulet), Guys & Dolls (San Diego CLO), Singing In The Rain (Welk), Into The Woods & Dixie Highway (Solomon Theatre), and the world premiere of American Rhythm (Lamb's Players Theatre). 





### A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

Welcome to the beginning of my 20th year at SBHS theatre! It seems like only a little moment ago I had just been hired by J.R. Richards. My soon-to-be wife and I had just finished painting the stage black (in the summer of 1996), and we had added our graffiti to the amazing history of art scrawl on the backstage walls of the theatre. And then, in what seemed like thesame moment, I blinked and my tiny girl, in a playpen on stage, well, I turned and she is almost 18 and planning her new adventure in the world—

All around me are the artifacts of the joy I have found as an artist and a teacher in the last two decades: an enormous Grail, the gravestone of Cinderella's mother, an airplane propeller; the jaws of a whale, the World Wide Wicket Company globe, a barrel on wheels; shoes and swords and hooks and heads of beasts, clocks and keys and perfect leaves: all the fingerprints and ghosts of characters and quirky voices, all the shouts and surprise and tears and belly laughs echoing in dusty corners.

I am not ready, not yet; it is too soon to turn and look backwards; I am content to look in the rear view mirror (a peculiar mirror because nothing ever recedes in the distance) and point myself to what is on the horizon in front of me: a circus of enormous books, of thrones and coffins and magic boxes made of books. PIPPIN is a play about the struggle for the control of one's narrative: who gets to tell your story? What happens in the crucible where you encounter the world? Who decides? We chose books as our setting for the players to perform, and for Pippin to experience the world because books are magical: no digital age, or touch screen mania, will ever be able to match the almost inconceivable alchemy that occurs between the written word and its ability to unlock the magic in your own imagination, to love and hate characters who live and die, hate and love...the written word is the greatest feat of magic in the whole history of our civilization. I fell in love with books and the power of stories at a very young age, and have been held spellbound since. I am near sixty now (!) and Hamlet and Frodo, Jane Eyre and Lear, Juliet, Cordelia, Alice and Dorothy Gale all inhabit the deep reaches of my imagination. I fell in love with theatre because it is the written word made manifest—and it is live.

And so I look forward, always forward, ahead in life with my dearest partner in adventure--as we make our way boldly down the path less travelled, with ghosts and children and lions and tigers and bears, oh my! -and make our own story up as we go. Thanks for writing this chapter with us.
