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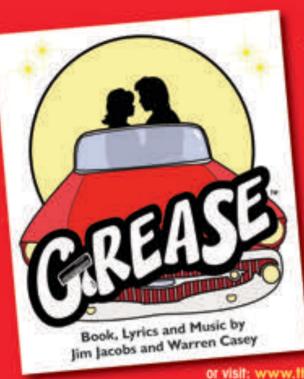

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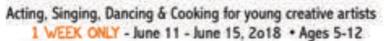
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#### SANTA BARBARA HIGH SCHOOL THEATRE CLASS OF 2018

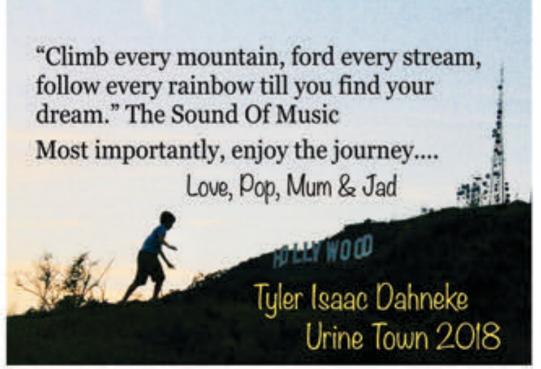

Gianna Burright (Choreographer) has recently completed her MFA in Choreography at Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music and Dance in London England, where she was a Leverhulme scholar and the recipient of the Lesley-Anne Sayers Research Award. Gianna has showcased her work all over Europe and the United States, including the Turner Contemporary Gallery, Bonnie Bird Theatre, The Hatlen Theatre and Resolutions Dance Festival. Gianna is passionate about choreographing, performing and being a dance educator.

#### WHO'S WHO?

Jon Nathan (Musical Director), has been a figure in the Santa Barbara musical scene since his arrival in the area in 1992. He holds a Bachelor of Music in Jazz Studies from the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, and a Master of Music in Percussion Performance from California State University at Northridge. During his time there, he was introduced to William Kraft, and was asked to continue studies with Professor Kraft at UCSB, where he completed his Doctor of Musical Arts degree. Currently, Dr. Nathan is principal timpanist with Opera Santa Barbara as well as Director of Jazz Ensembles and Lecturer in Percussion and Percussion Ensemble at UCSB. He has served as Jazz Ensemble Director and Percussion Instructor at Moorpark College, has taught Techniques of Percussion at and private percussion lessons at Westmont College, and was the Applied Music Percussion Instructor at Santa Barbara City College. Urinetown is Dr. Nathan's thirteenth collaboration with SBHS Music Theatre, having served as Music Director for Crybaby (Fall 2017) Bullets Over Broadway (Spring 2018), Young Frankenstein (Fall 2016), Hair (Spring, 2016) MOTN (Winter, 2016-18), Pippin (Fall, 2015), How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying (Spring, 2014) and Big Fish (Fall, 2014), and as Instrumental Music Director for Spamalot (Spring, 2013), and music consultant for The Mystery of Edwin Drood (Spring, 2015). He is also currently serving as music director for UCSB's Department of Theatre and Dance's production of Cabaret, which will feature members of the UCSB Jazz Ensemble as the Kits Kay Club orchestra.

Sio Tepper (Vocal Director) Born and raised in Santa Barbara, Sio has been involved with the local music and arts culture for several years. She studied classical piano locally with Marilyn Clemons and Lana Bodnar, and attended the Music and Arts Conservatory throughout middle school and high school. She graduated from Santa Barbara High in 2010, and from UCSB in 2014 with a degree in Ethnomusicology.

Sio is continuously inspired to give back to the community that shaped her as an artist by being involved in music and arts education. Currently, she teaches piano, guitar, and songwriting privately to students of various ages through her own studio and through SB Musicology. She is also an educator in the Santa Barbara High School Theatre Department, having worked on nearly a dozen productions as vocal director, co-music director, and conductor. She is currently a specialist teacher for the Advanced Theatre Class at SBHS. She has also worked with other local theatre companies such as Out of the Box Theatre production where she served as music director, Stage Left Productions and has also composed music for films in the Santa Barbara Film Festival. Sio performs locally with various collaborations in a range of musical styles such as classical trios, folk rock bands, and multi-media improv.

Having worked a large number of events in a wide variety of venues, Jonathan Mitchell (Technical Director) has come to Santa Barbara High School Theatre with a diverse and deep knowledge of set construction, audio, lighting, and more. #### A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

A few weeks ago, my lovely wife asked me, "how many shows is this for you?' I was paint-stained and not just a little bit bleary-eyed, standing in the kitchen. It took me a while to count them all. Twenty two years times two, minus the spring I got married and my friend Ben Bottoms directed Little Shop of Horrors (I was happy to be able to re-stage that show 15 years later): 43 productions. Before Music of the Night began at SBHS we did a third production in the winter, so: At This Evening's Performance; Durang, Durang; An Evening of One Acts: 46. The season we did four productions, so add God of Carnage and The Glass Menagerie. Summer? Cabaret. Oh, right: Hair, the production we took to Scotland in 2008. 50. And it has all passed so quickly, these 50 adventures with amazing collaborators, the art and passion thousands of students, audiences that keep coming back and making us what I believe is one of the best musical theatre schools in the country.

So why choose Urinetown, the Musical, for number 50? Because it really is about who we are as performers and artists: we assiduously avoid the dull safety of convention and the tried and true, we push the limits of what is possible on a high school stage, and because it is a terrific musical with great roles that (purposely) has a terrible title. It takes the seed of important ideas about the public good vs. private enterprise, unfettered capitalism vs. managed, regulated resources, and wraps it in a skin of parody, great music, and laughter. It trolls the overwrought passions of Les Miserables and the in your face, combative theatre of Brecht's Threepenny Opera (production number 4, and the first musical I ever did at SBHS), the "cool" of West Side Story (in Snuff the Girl), the wedding dance in Fiddler on the Roof, and even A Christmas Carol (one character is called Tiny Tom). It uses satire to take jabs at the legal system, capitalism, corrupt corporation, waste in terms of the environment and our sense of entitlement (amongst other things). It constantly questions the nature of musical theatre itself, and the temptation of self-importance. It is the most unlikely Tony Award winning musical, and one that we have had an incredible amount of fun putting on. We are fortunate to be at a high school that embraces theatre, and believes that students are legitimate artists, not children that need to be protected from the world. They, instead, confront the world with humor and passion and guts, laughing and singing to shake up the status quo.

Here's to more. More great theatre, more musicals rooted in a contemporary sensibility, more Time. More adventures with my friends on a playground we build and then tear down and build again (thank you Jonathan and Mike, Jon, Sio, Bonnie and Sophia, our new friend Gianna, and the hands and talents of so many students). And thank you most of all to my wife, who, like Hope in the show, taught me to Follow My Heart. I did, and here we are: a coupla softies, murmuring I do, I do—the mantra of our days.
